WELCOME TO THE AUSTRALIA DAY AWARDS 2024!

On Australia Day we celebrate all the things we love about Australia: land, sense of fair go, lifestyle, democracy, the freedoms we enjoy but particularly our people.

Australia Day is about acknowledging the contribution every Australian makes to our contemporary and dynamic nation. From our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who have been here for more than 65,000 years, to those who have lived here for generations, to those who have come from all corners of the globe to call our country home.

Tomorrow, the 26 January is an important date in Australia's history that has evolved over time. Starting as a celebration for emancipated convicts, it is a day to acknowledge past wrongs and show respect for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples' survival, resilience and enduring culture.

It is also a day we pay respect to the stories, histories and contributions of the Australians who lived, worked and fought for the values and freedoms we often take for granted.

And it is a day we celebrate the diversity of this nation's people with our various cultures, traditions and belief systems.

Australia Day continues to be hugely popular, with 3 in 4 Australians believing it has a bigger meaning beyond being just a day off.

More than half of all Australians participate in Australia Day activities on or around the 26 January, organised by State Governments, local councils, community groups or by getting together with family and friends. In addition, over 16,000 new Australians become citizens on Australia Day.

AUSTRALIA DAY AMBASSADOR DR DIMITY DORNAN AO

Dr Dimity Dornan

Founder, Hear and Say
Founder and Chair, Bionics Queensland

Dr Dimity Dornan AO is a social entrepreneur, bionics advocate, speech pathologist and researchers.

In 1992 she established Hear and Say as a leading not-for-profit for deaf children learning to listen and speak, particularly with surgically implantable hearing technology like the bionic ear.

She is currently sharing her experience for the benefit of the stakeholders in the wider bionics industry. As Founder and Chair of Bionics Gamechangers Australia, Dr Dornan is aiming to bring outcomes similar to those legendary ones possible for many people who use



the bionic ear to other new spin-off devices like bionic senses, mobility, brains, and organs. She has been working to promote the bionics industry and help bring new bionics solutions to market for the benefit of people with previously untreatable medical problems. These include not only hearing but also visual, neurological, limb, organ and other conditions.

Dr Dimity Dornan was awarded the Queensland Senior Australian of the Year in 2018.



COMMUNITY EVENT OF THE YEAR NOMINEES

Gindie Ashes and Country Fair (Gindie State School P & C)

Gindie State School P&C hosts an annual cricket day, a vital fundraiser for the school with around 30 students. The 2023 Gindie Ashes and Country Fair, held on August 6, raised an impressive \$18,000. The event featured a cricket tournament, a country fair, rides, information tents, live music, petting zoo, face-painting, fashion parade, line dancing, raffles, auctions, and unique activities from organisations like Freshwater Fishing and Stocking Association QLD, Remote Area Families Service, JCU, and Springsure Fire and Emergency Services. The funds contribute to enriching the students' experiences, bringing activities like Boots 'n' All Line Dancing and Little Gem Yoga to the school. Over 50 local businesses and companies supported the fair, fostering community connections amid the predominantly Primary Producer Gindie community.

Halloween on Mayfair (CH Social Events)

CH Social Events has orchestrated remarkable events for our community, with the recent Halloween on Mayfair standing out as a memorable night. Their commitment goes beyond event planning, involving countless volunteer hours to ensure success. Going the extra mile, they've not only promoted local businesses through social media but also emphasised the significance of youth mental health. Their efforts have brought economic advantages to local businesses, facilitated events with over 80 stalls, and spotlighted the diverse services Emerald provides. By uniting the community in a single space, they've fostered awareness and appreciation for the offerings that make Emerald unique.

Pasifika Vybez (Central Highlands Junior Rugby Union)

Pasifika Vybez 2023, a pioneering event in Emerald, showcased the rich cultural tapestry of the community, featuring diverse backgrounds such as Tongan, Samoan, and Māori, among others. The talented youth performers, affiliated with Titans Rugby, learned traditional dances and songs from community members who generously volunteered their time and knowledge. The event became a platform for intergenerational knowledge exchange. The impressive turnout underscored its success, sparking discussions about the prospect of next year's edition. Notably, all food and beverages were locally sourced from establishments like Coles, Pias Place, Fair Dinkum Meats, Bidfoods, and BWS. The venue, McIndoe, was chosen to host this cultural celebration.

Dominating cross country, swimming, and athletics, he broke records and represented Central Highlands and Capricornia. Recognised as a gifted cyclist, Douglas secured a spot for track cycling-endurance at the 'YOU FOR 2032' session in Rockhampton. With a dedicated coach, he excelled in road racing, velodrome, and MTB endurance events across Queensland, achieving notable wins like the Mackay Road Series and Bundy Cycling Spectacular. Accepted into the Defence Force, Douglas leaves in February or April, serving as an inspiration for dedication, fair play, and sporting excellence.



Amber Collie

In 2023, Amber showcased her leadership in acrobatic competitions through a partnership, demonstrating versatility as both an independent performer and a team player. Respected as a senior acrobat and mentor, she actively trains and coaches. dedicating two days a week to share her knowledge. Holding a judging accreditation, Amber contributes to the club's success at away competitions.
